On April 6, 1941, the Reds scored 15 runs in the seventh inning, setting a record that still stands today. This achievement is not only the first major record but also one of the longest-standing records in our history.

Throughout the Pandilla Escarlata nine decades of existence, branding has been one of its hallmarks, with hundreds of examples documented in specialized books.

Of the nearly two thousand players who have worn the red uniform, two stand out for having broken records multiple times and set new marks: Daniel Fernández and José Luis “Borrego” Sandoval. Both are proudly Mexican and were developed within our organization.
